





A Celebration of Saints

As the air turns cooler in the desert southwest, it always signals the start of one of my favorite times of the church year-the season of saints. At one time, the church calendar in November had the most saint days—beginning, of course, with the Feast of All Saints, November 1. All Saints is the one major feast in the calendar of the church that can take precedence of a Sunday—it literally can be moved. This year, it happens to fall on a Monday, November 1 does, so celebrating All Saints on the following Sunday, which the prayer book allows, puts our observance of the Feast of All Saints as its latest possible date: November 7.

On All Saints, we give thanks to God for the lives of those saints who have gone before us over the arc of time leading up to the present—both the wellknown "Saints" of church history and the lesser known "saints" of recent history, and the saints in the history of our lives. People we have known, whose lives touched our lives in major or minor ways, but have touched us, nonetheless. During the prayers of the people, we say the names of those we wish to remember who have died: beginning with members of Advent church, then those names of our friends and families that we listed in the Book of Remembrance during October-those who have died in the previous year, and those who have died whom we still miss greatly or for whom we give deep thanks to God in our remembrance this day.

On this day, we also renew our own baptismal vows in the words of the Baptismal Covenant. It is truly a day for restoring our spiritual vision—to refocus the goal and purpose of our lives—to love God with all one's heart, soul, mind, and strength, and to love our neighbor as ourselves. And in that loving, to draw closer to Christ and each other. Do not miss attending church on All Saints' Sunday, November 7—it is surely a day of great solemnity and celebration!

Then on Sunday, November 14, we will honor our Veterans at Advent with a special food and fellowship following the 10:00 AM service. Paine Hall will be magically transformed into a "USO station," and we will try to guess the name of that soldier whose picture in uniform while serving will be posted in Paine Hall. We give thanks to God for those who answered the call to serve our country in military service, especially those who are now member of Advent—both living and dead—and we continually

pray for the safety of those men and women in uniform who still serve, and put themselves in harm's way when necessary to defend our country and its freedoms. Do not miss the Veterans Day special food and fellowship on Sunday, November 14.



On Sunday, **November 21**, we will hold our annual Volunteer Appreciation Sunday luncheon, in Paine Hall following the 10:00 AM service. On this day we wish to publicly thank all the people who serve in one way or another in the over 50 ministries that take place throughout the year at Advent. One cannot over emphasize the importance of people's willingness to offer their time and talent in the service of the church, the body of Christ living and serving on earth—so we take one Sunday to specifically acknowledge and give thanks for those persons who serve at Advent. No one serves in order to receive thanks or recognition, of course, but we must thank and acknowledge those persons who freely give of their time, who use their life knowledge and skill, to further the work of ministry at Advent.

Like people who give freely of their financial resources in gratitude to God for all God's blessings

Stewardship Is About Good Priorities *by Rev. Rob Blezard*

"When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Do not go over your vineyard a second time or pick up the grapes that have fallen. Leave them for the poor and the foreigner. I am the LORD your God." –Leviticus19:9-10

"What I earn is mine, ALL mine, to do with what I want." That's the message our culture tells us again and again. Yet the Leviticus 19:9-10 clearly tells us that the "mine, all mine" attituded existed some 2,500 years ago as well. It's hard-wired into us.

Our sinful human nature leads us to claim all we can for ourselves, which is why for thousands of years God has called faithful people to live a better way. In this passage, "the Lord your God" instructs farmers and vintners to harvest only once, and not to the very edges of their land, and to leave the remnants of the harvest to the poor and the foreigner – people on the margins scavenging for their daily bread.

The teaching encourages landowners to find sufficiency in their first harvest and then be generous with what is left over. Today, Leviticus 19:9-10 challenges us whose "harvests" of income are more than sufficient to satisfy our immediate needs. Do we have to take it all? What can we give for the needy?

In this traditional season of harvest, what blessings can you count from the last year? (Take a few minutes to prayerfully consider this, and make a list). Does your harvest more than adequately meet your needs?

Now prayerfully consider how much you can generously "leave" for the needy? Consider this in making a year-end contribution to your congregation, or in determining a pledge for 2022.
